# Valediction - Leaving a Legacy

Heritage comes from valuing the past.

Many childrens' books are about searches recovering lost memories from older people with a certain knowledge who are reluctant to recall past events and times<sup>1, 2</sup>. The search often becomes a journey discovering the wisdom of life or finding the "holy grail" where "all will be revealed". Through persistent questions and imagination, the searchers in these books inspire the elders to share their knowledge for the good of mankind. The searchers are usually successful because their elders' past were valued and appealed to a basic human need – to leave a legacy.

The 1960-64 students of Ibrox Park BHS were part of the beginning of a school's heritage. They are an elder generation with memories of times past and perhaps the instigators of leaving a legacy for future generations. A legacy is much about the future as it is about the past. This "yesteryear" yearbook provides a keyhole view of another time; it is part of a "patchwork" fabric of Leichhardt's unique history.

With hindsight, these past students understand the importance of Ibrox Park BHS's heritage - they know that it has hardly been recognised and is in jeopardy of being lost forever. While selective schools have built traditions, Leichhardt's Secondary Schools have been restructured, reorganised and rebadged to create new perceptions that suit socio-educational-political reforms. With each reform, the heritage of Leichhardt's secondary schools has been buried in the past and fast becoming lost memories.<sup>3</sup>

Ibrox Park is a far-away memory and like an Arthurian chalice evokes reflection from fading memories; it has become an enigma. The name of that long-time-ago dusty football park and a school that borrowed its name is hardly known. Was it really there?

This "yesteryear" yearbook records times, captures lost memories and perhaps a first step towards creating a heritage. The yearbook records some historical facts and events that will become increasingly relevant to current times. Schools with rich heritage and established traditions appeal to new enrolments as well as promote a school's profile as a demonstration of its pedagogy and values; it creates a heritage tapestry that should include student and teacher records, Alumni reunions, foundations and scholarships.

With heritage and traditions in mind, what is the real purpose of this valedictory yearbook – a farewell to times long past or could it be something else?

At a time when social networks such as Facebook, Blogs and My-space abound why would Ibrox Park BHS require a yearbook? The answer involves satisfying basic human needs – to belong; to feel valued and to be heard. It was; it is a way to record heartfelt sentiments about friendships, activities, sports and diverse interests; it is a public record that reflects events and times past; it is a valued statement about people and a valuable future resource; it fulfils a basic responsibility to record a school's history.

The 1960-64 lbrox Park BHS yearbook provides a memory-history-record-reference book for a school recovering lost memories and establishing a heritage. Hopefully, it may also precipitate the recording of the "life and times" of Leichhardt's secondary schools: National School, Junior Technical School, Domestic Science Girls' School, Leichhardt Girls' High School, Leichhardt High (1976-05) and Sydney Secondary College (2005-present).

Leaving a legacy involves valuing the past, living in the present and looking to the future.

# Ibrox Park B.H.S. - The Beginning

Ibrox Park<sup>1</sup> Boys High School opened its doors in 1960 to students from Leichhardt and surrounding working-class Sydney suburbs: Annandale, Balmain, Birchgrove, Glebe, Haberfield, Lilyfield, Orange Grove, Petersham, Rozelle and Stanmore. Nearly all the students came from working-class backgrounds largely influenced by social circumstances and tempered by ethnic-tribal-class-religious mind-sets as well as "what side of the street people lived". In short, prejudices sparked by differences and shifting attitudes; it was a tough environment that complicated life's challenges and created personal and family struggles.

Ibrox Park was the beginning of a new education era that was going to provide fresh opportunities and changes to an established social fabric - the key was education.



1. Mr. E. Smith Principal Ibrox Park BHS

The principal, Mr. E. Smith, made a huge initial impression with his attitude and plans for his students. At the first assembly, students were asked to stand as Mr. Smith made a stage left entrance in a flowing black academic gown flanked by subject masters who sat with an air of authority controlling students with lingering stares and facial expressions. Students slowly stopped sniggering and shuffling when he stood behind a lectern gripping each side and piercingly glared at every student through his black hornrimmed glasses; it was a "make or break" moment. The pause was palpable. Expectations were being raised. There was no doubt as to who was in control. Students were not sure what was going on but knew school life wasn't what they had experienced.

What would a principal say at that first assembly of a new school who had an almost impossible mission to broaden his students' minds through education; it was not just about winning over hearts and minds but also changing entrenched attitudes towards education. It was a formidable test that most other principals would have avoided for fear of failure. Yet there was this diminutive man with an audacious plan determined to set new standards and "raise the bar" at a school in an area where education competed with everyday needs.

As a way of getting started, he focused on the school uniform and student behaviour. Gesticulating with a frown accentuated by his thick black glasses Mr. Smith insisted with a shrill voice "Students must wear the school tie... jackets must be worn to and from school... students will be sent home... teachers will inspect classes".

Mr. Smith continued, "Bad behaviour will not be tolerated... going to and from school you set an example... you represent the school when you wear the uniform... standards will be maintained".

"What's all this" older students thought slouching in the back rows of the hall while first year students sat open-eyed in sombre silence wondered "This is different". The students in the back rows slouched further, defiantly preening their hair into "dovetails" and tugging at their "James Dean" forelocks hanging over their foreheads, quietly snarling under their breath.

"Yeah... we'll see, Panda2."

The scene was set. A rebellious few in one corner, the wondrous many in another and a determined principal accompanied by teachers in another; it was to become a three-ring event loaded with drama and marvel.

At each assembly a string of students were ejected for talking, making noises or anything else that didn't comply with expectations. They would saunter off to silent cheers and secret admiration by other students to the Deputy Principal's Office "to be dealt with". The degree of punishment was determined by who sent the boys out - if the Principal sent the boys out there was no doubt they were in for "six of the best" while an ejection by a junior teacher would attract 1-2-4 strokes of the cane. The Deputy, Mr. Piper, had so many boys outside his office it would form a "Congo line" extending down the corridor, around the corner to the outside area. Some cantankerous students would seize the opportunity to disappear for awhile, have a smoke, and when they were "good and ready", amble back to class holding their hands to be hailed as wounded heroes.

The school assembly was a weekly drama laced with light and dark scenes, stage exits, eulogies, tragedies and curtain calls; it was the main event of the week.

"In 1959 at Leichhardt Central Junior Technical School there were 381 enrolments, 19 teachers, 11 classes and 78 Intermediate Certificate candidates.

In 1961 there were 614 enrolments, 30 teachers and 108 Intermediate Certificate candidates.

In 1964 there were 618 enrolments, 34 teachers, 12 classes and 78 Intermediate Certificate candidates.

The senior school has never been very large, reaching about 70 at its maximum..." 3

#### Ibrox Park - A Place Name

#### **Background**

Ibrox Park Pronunciation: Ibrox (English: 'aibroks'; Scottish Gaelic: Àth Bruic) Park.

A Scottish Gaelic interpretation of Ibrox means "badger ford".

The name Ibrox is also believed to be Gaelic for "badger's set". A collective name for a group of badgers is a "cete". Accordingly, badger dens are called "setts".

A place name for part of the land bounded by Derbyshire and Balmain Roads in the suburb of Leichhardt, NSW (Figure 1).

The extent of the original site is shown by the Leichhardt Municipality Map, 1880's, Land and Property Information (LPI) Cadastral Records and delineated in parts by DP 53885 and DP 1147039. (Figures 2, 4, 5 and 6).

The extent of the original portion is shown by the Survey of 4 acres 0 roods 36 perches<sup>1</sup>, FP (File Plan) 3885 also known as DP 53885 (Figure 4). The portion included the future sites of Ibrox Park and Derbyshire Reserve.

The name Ibrox Park was first used in the 1880's and adopted as part of a school name, Ibrox Park Boys High School 1960-76 (Figure 3).

The Ibrox Park site is presently part of the Sydney Secondary College and enclosed within the southern part of Lot 100, DP1147039 under the control of the NSW Education Department. (Figure 6).

It is proposed to rename Derbyshire Reserve to Ibrox Park. Derbyshire Reserve<sup>i</sup> is part of the last remaining part of the original portion (Figure 4) and is contiguous to the site known previously as Ibrox Park (Figures 7, 8, 9 and 10). The Reserve is managed by Leichhardt Municipal Council.

# History

Leichhardt's Ibrox Park was originally named after Ibrox Park in Glasgow, Scotland located on the south side of the River Clyde. Ibrox is also a District name in the City of Glasgow adjacent to the District of Govan.

Glasgow's Ibrox Park became the renowned home of the Rangers' Football Club; it is now known as Ibrox Stadium. Ibrox Park was more than a football ground; it was a place where Scottish pride was exemplified and a rallying place that enlivened Scottish spirit. From the time Glasgow's Ibrox Park first opened its gates for a game between Rangers and Preston North End it was not just about a place where football was played; it epitomized what it was to be Scottish. It was likely when the Rangers first moved to the "Old Ibrox Park" in 1887 or when the "New Ibrox Park" was opened on 30 December 1899 sparked the naming of Leichhardt's Ibrox Park.<sup>2</sup>

Leichhardt's Ibrox Park has been thought to be named by Scottish immigrants/descendents that played football on the site and named it after Glasgow's Ibrox Park.<sup>3</sup> The place name Ibrox Park first appeared in the Leichhardt Municipality Map, 1880's, (Figure 2). The name Ibrox Park was

subsequently adopted as the name for a secondary school, Ibrox Park Boys High School, which opened in 1960 and was the site for a number of secondary schools: Ibrox Park Boys High School (1960-76), Leichhardt High (1976-05) and part of Sydney Secondary College (2005-present).

The use of the place name Ibrox Park ceased in about 1976 when Ibrox Park Boys High School was renamed Leichhardt High when the school was reorganised to include boys and girls. However, the school name Ibrox Park BHS, is referred to at school reunions and anniversaries.<sup>4</sup>

#### **Heritage**

The place name Ibrox Park and its associated school name, Ibrox Park Boys High, has become a faded memory – there are little historical resources, no edifices or inscriptions to its existence. In contrast, the name Ibrox continues to flourish as part of Glasgow's heritage: Ibrox Public School, Ibrox Community Complex, Ibrox Stadium the home of the Rangers Football Club and Ibrox Primary School.

The importance of belonging is a visceral human need, especially to a place. Belonging depends on a potent sense of the past and an unshakeable sagacity of loyalty. A deep attachment to a place is nourished in a way that reflects people's lives and defines their identity.

The place name Ibrox Park is an integral part of Leichhardt's history; it is more than just a place for Scottish Immigrants to play football in a dusty Leichhardt field back in the 1880's and for school students to learn, play and grow during 1960-76; it is a place that has been linked through a common heritage and a common dream for a grander life at different times.

Leichhardt's Ibrox Park is a place with significant historical and social values that epitomises working class aspirations when times were particularly tough. It was a place where dreams were shared by different generations struggling with social, economic and cultural hardships. Their adversity borne from personal, family and "working class" challenges created the grit of determination to succeed in life. To dream of a grander place from a field and school in struggling Leichhardt at different times was a shared future hope, a "light on the hill" and a way of "getting through the day" for immigrants and students alike. To dream of a grander place from the hill and a way of "getting through the day" for immigrants and students alike.

The heritage values of the place name Ibrox Park must be conserved; it is important that the N.S.W. Department of Education and Training, Sydney Secondary College, N.S.W Geographical Names Board, Leichhardt Municipal Council and Local Historical Associations take steps to conserve its significance; it is a place name that should not slip into obscurity.

The place name Ibrox Park has been approved by the NSW Geographical Names Board in 2012 as a heritage item in the NSW Geographical Names Board Register. In May 2015 Leichhardt Municipal Council after public consultation and assessment has agreed to rename Derbyshire Reserve to Ibrox Park. The renaming has been referred to the NSW Geographical Names Board for approval.

It is suggested that the historical resources of the place name Ibrox Park and its associated school name, Ibrox Park Boys High School, be further developed with the following considerations:

Record the heritage of Leichhardt's Secondary Schools: National (Petersham) School, Leichhardt Junior Technical School, Leichhardt Domestic Science Girls School and Leichhardt Girls High School, <sup>9</sup> Ibrox Park Boys High School and Leichhardt High – all forerunners of the present Sydney Secondary College.

It is suggested that an appropriate historical record be created by adding a facility to the Sydney Secondary College Website.

Commemorating the place name Ibrox Park by naming an appropriate area, such as renaming Derbyshire Reserve to Ibrox Park (APPNDIX 4):


The heritage significance of Derbyshire Reserve is not known; it is assumed that its name originated from the adjacent Derbyshire Road (Figures 2, 4).

The renaming of the Derbyshire Reserve to Ibrox Park would acknowledge the heritage value and origin of the name Ibrox Park and its connection with Leichhardt's early settlers. Particularly the 10,608 people buried in Balmain Cemetery (Pioneers Memorial Park) many of whom would have been familiar with Leichhardt's Ibrox Park.

Strengthening historical links with Leichhardt's early development when its settlers struggled with social and working class circumstances associated with challenging times – their contribution to Leichhardt's and Sydney's growth and prosperity needs to be further acknowledged.

Explore the opportunity to build appropriate relationships with Glasgow City Council and Glasgow's Schools who have a historical namesake<sup>10</sup> connection with Leichhardt's Ibrox Park. The envisaged relationship would enhance Leichhardt's heritage and help develop a greater understanding of Leichhardt's early times.

The "portion" of land known as Ibrox Park shown on the Leichhardt Municipality Map dated 1880's was originally bounded by Moore Street West, Derbyshire and Balmain Roads to the north of the present Derbyshire Reserve. (Figure 2).

During that time Crown and Freehold lands were subdivided into lots or portions. The "portion" known as Ibrox Park at that time was likely vacant Crown Land before "disposal" <sup>11</sup> for another use.

Ibrox Park was a colloquial name that found its way into common usage and subsequently included with Parish/Municipal Maps and Estate Plans.

Anecdotally, it has been claimed that the first principal, of Ibrox Park Boys High School, Mr. E Smith, named the school after Leichhardt's place name Ibrox Park, which was likely to be named after Ibrox Park, Glasgow. The final approval for the school's name and emblem would have rested with the NSW Government supported by Leichhardt Municipal Council. (Figure 3).

Presumably, Mr. Smith was involved with the planning of the school site in the late 1950's and would have been aware of the 1880's Leichhardt Municipality Map where the place name "*lbrox Park*" was shown.

The school's name was subsequently adopted from the place name "Ibrox Park" and was known as Ibrox Park Boys High School from 1960 until 1976 when its name changed to Leichhardt High.

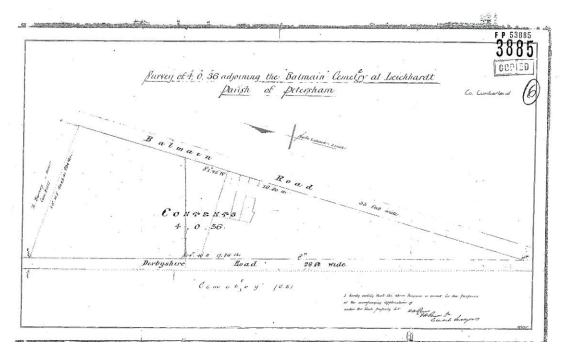





#### **End Notes**

<sup>i</sup> Derbyshire Reserve is bounded by Balmain Road, Derbyshire Road and Sydney Secondary College. The site is comprised of mature trees, seating, raised sandstone block walls, mounded plantings and grassed areas. The trees provide substantial shaded areas with a paved walkway that connects Derbyshire Road with Balmain Road. The Reserve has been designed for passive use or perhaps seen as a green haven, which provides respite from the busyness of the traffic. About 50% of the Reserve is grassed area interspersed with meandering paved areas, border shrubs and dominant native and exotic trees.

It is suggested that historical narratives would enhance the purpose of the Reserve and improve the focus of the landscape. Screening from Balmain Road would strengthen its passive use and improve the integrity of the Reserve. Consideration could be given to enhancing a prime planting area presently occupied by a deciduous Liquid Amber Tree.

Derbyshire Reserve was previously occupied by "Jack's Garage" - a "Golden Fleece" petrol station providing mechanical repairs. (Source: Brian McMorrine, 2015).



"Ibrox dreaming... a Leichhardt boy" is an untold story; it treads lightly back into a fading time where Ibrox Park meant different things to different people; its significance comes from a notion of a place in Leichhardt where early Scottish immigrants dreamt of a grander place in Glasgow – Ibrox Park. It was also that same place in the 1960-70's where Ibrox Park Boys High School students also dreamt of a grander place.


Balmain Cemetery was levelled after the monuments of "prominent people" were removed to Camperdown Cemetery.

The "Architectus - Leichhardt Walking Tour" brochure states that "the burials had few prominent people" including Edmund Blacket (Architect), Thomas Rowntree (Architect) and Ferdinand Reus (Surveyor) and that 16 memorials were relocated to Camperdown Cemetery.

After the removal of the prominent memorials the remaining headstones and memorials of the not-so-prominent people were covered with fill or used in the "conversion" of the cemetery into a "rest park and garden area".

Headstones and monuments were broken-up or carved into blocks for a park wall. Only a few of the monument's inscriptions were transcribed and no headstones were placed as memorials around the site as required by the "Old Balmain (Leichhardt) Act, 1941".





## More than a Game

Rugby League was more than a game at Ibrox Park. For many students, it was a sport that provided a way of building self-esteem, confidence, peer acceptance and school pride. It was not just about winning; it was more about giving your utmost, not holding back a gram of energy, stretching beyond the normal and giving a total commitment to team mates striving to find themselves in uncertain socio-economic circumstances and compensating for an unequal educational system.

Rugby League for most was a way of validating a "never give-in" attitude and satisfying visceral needs to feel valued, to belong and to be heard particularly playing against selective schools with haughty "better than you" attitudes.

Ibrox Park Rugby League Teams were successful in all weight grades. <sup>11</sup> The most successful Team was arguably Ibrox Park's 1962 First Grade Team <sup>12</sup> who competed in the final of the University Shield Competition that year. The team members included Dennis Tutty, John Bradley, Theo Baloglow, Vince Di Bella, Dennis Yagger and David Muir. Mr. Denis Scott was the coach and mathematics teacher. Denis at the 2014 School Reunion mentioned the exceptional qualities of the team and the outstanding abilities of the individuals.

The University Shield Competition started in 1922 by the University of Sydney Rugby League Club who provided a shield for a statewide High School Rugby League knockout competition; it was the most prestigious competition in schoolboy rugby league.

The final was played against Newcastle High at the Sydney Cricket Ground on Wednesday, 18<sup>th</sup> July, 1962, before the main game between Great Britain and Saint George in front of 57,744 spectators. Although the Ibrox Park team narrowly lost to Newcastle High 8-6, they swelled the hearts of fellow students with pride who had watched the game standing on the "SCG Hill". Along with the mighty St George team, who lost to Great Britain 33-5, the Ibrox Park Team was gallant in defeat and through an "innocent pass" <sup>13</sup> just missed out winning the 1962 University Shield Competition.





From 1937 the Board of Secondary School Studies was responsible for the Intermediate Certificate examinations until 1966 when it was replaced by the Wyndham Scheme. The Intermediate Certificate provided many students with their only educational qualification as most left school to work.

For the 1962 students, about one hundred students departed school with the Intermediate Certificate. Most of the departing students were part of the original 1960 student intake estimated to be about one hundred and fifty of the 504 enrollments<sup>2</sup>. About thirty one students from the 1960 student intake continued to the Leaving Certificate.



MATHEMATICS.—Each candidate taking Mathematics at the Leaving Certificate Examination should come provided with (1) a pair of compasses, (2) a ruler marked in inches and centimetres, and (3) a protractor. Squared paper and mathematical tables are provided for the use of candidates. Only the tables specified and supplied by this Department are issued for the papers named. Under no circumstances should candidates bring their own tables or squared paper to the Examination Room, nor is it permissible to use publications other than those specified, viz., The "New Commonwealth" Mathematical Tables by T. K. Haron, B.Sc. For the Applied Mathematics (formerly Mechanics) paper and for the Honours papers in Mathematics the use of the Slide Rule is permissible under conditions similar to those given in the following paragraph.

PHYSICS CHEMISTRY:—Mathematical Tables as for the Mathematics papers will be supplied and squared paper will be available for the use of candidates when taking either the Pass or the Honours paper in Physics, Chemistry, or the Combined Physics and Chemistry paper and Economics Honours. The use of the Slide Rule by candidates taking Physics and Chemistry papers is permissible, provided the instrument bears the original printed matter only on the back; no Slide Rule bearing notes added by the candidate may be used. All instruments must be submitted for inspection by the Supervising Officer before the examination session commences.

PHYSICS.—Candidates presenting Physics should provide themselves with a rule divided accurately both into inches and tenths and into centimetres and millimetres, a pair of compasses and a protractor. As hitherto, candidates may also use a slide rule. They will be supplied with mathematical tables and graph paper.

SCIENCE NOTE-BOOKS.—Candidates taking Science subjects at the Leaving Certificate Examination must produce note-books bearing a certificate on the front page, signed by the Science Teacher, that the student has performed a satisfactory course of practical work. Candidates taking the Pass Paper only must hand in their books at the time fixed for the issue of the Pass Paper. Those taking Honours may retain their books until the Honours Paper, but must hand their books to the Presiding Officer prior to the issue of the Honours question paper. In their own interest candidates should see that no delay occurs in presenting their books. Each note-book should contain (1) the distinguishing number of the candidate and (2) the name of the school of which the candidate is a pupil, or in the case of non-school candidates the postal address. The Presiding Officer will forward them to the respective Examiner. The packets should be endorsed "Leaving Certificate Examination—Science Note-books", and forwarded by post.

SCHOOL CANDIDATES presenting themselves for Science subjects where the submissions of a practical note-book is prescribed will be required to submit a signed statement in regard to the record of their practical work.

A PRIVATE STUDY CANDIDATE presenting a Science subject where the submission of a practical note-book is prescribed is required to furnish Statutory Declarations made by himself and his Teacher in regard to his practical work.

DESCRIPTIVE GEOMETRY & DRAWING.—Each candidate should come provided with:—drawing board—half Imperial size, T-square to suit, 2 set squares—1 of 45° and 1 of 60°-30°, a se of drawing instruments to include those required for ink work, a set of draughtsman's cardboard scales, protractor, french curves (oxtional), chalk, bottle of Indian ink (black), pen, pencils, drawing pins, ink eraser and pencil eraser.

ART.—In schools where candidates are presenting Art, one specimen of Applied Art should be forwarded by each candidate (in accordance with directions given in circular to Teachers), not later than 21st October.

DRESSMAKING.—Candidates are expected to provide themselves with ruler, scissors, inch tape, pencil, rubber, tracing wheel, pins and paste.

GEOGRAPHY.—For the Pass and Honours papers in Geography, candidates who wish to do so will be permitted to provide themselves with coloured pencils or crayons and Indian or coloured ink. They will be supplied with Mathematical tables and graph paper.

COMBINED PHYSICS AND CHEMISTRY (PHYSICS SECTION).—In the Physics Section of the question paper in Combined Physics and Chemistry at the Leaving Certificate Examination, the Chief Examiner may set some questions which can only be answered with the aid of certain drawing instruments. Each candidate should, therefore, be instructed to take into the examination room a foot-rule divided both into inches and tenths and into centimetres and millimetres, a compass and a protractor. As hitherto, candidates may also use a slide-rule, and they will be supplied with mathematical tables and graph paper. No slide rule or foot-rule containing notes added by the candidates may be used.

The Official Opening was held on 30<sup>th</sup> September, 1960 that included a march down Norton Street perhaps to signify the move from Leichhardt Junior Technical School in Marion Street to Ibrox Park B.H.S., Balmain Road.

The opening created a great deal of interest where it was reported in local media.

"A school with a light steel structural frame with colourful curtain walls has been completed for the education Department in Balmain Road, Leichhardt.

Ibrox Park Boys' High School at Leichhardt is the first of a new type of secondary school erected for the Department of Education." <sup>2</sup>

Although the official opening was held in September, Ibrox Park B.H.S opened its doors earlier in February, 1960 to students from Leichhardt and surrounding suburbs Annandale, Balmain, Birchgrove, Glebe, Haberfield, Lilyfield, Orangegrove, Petersham, Rozelle and Stanmore.

"Ibrox Park Boys' High School was first occupied on Tuesday, 2<sup>nd</sup> February, 1960. However, it was not until much later in the year, on Friday, 30th September, that the school was officially opened by the then Minister for Education, the Honourable E. Wetherell, M.L.A." <sup>3</sup>

The order of proceedings of the official opening and official guests are described in "The Ibroxian 1969".







The photograph of Ian Chapman, Peter Board and the school's southern building is taken from the Pioneers' Memorial Park (formerly Balmain Cemetery) and adjacent to Derbyshire Road. The area to the right of the building was a teachers' car park. The Pioneer's Memorial Park was built over Balmain Cemetery. The cemetery operated from 1868 until 1912 and formerly closed by the Old Balmain (Leichhardt) Act 1941. The cemetery was "converted" to the Pioneers Memorial Park in 1941 amidst community concern about the 10,608 burials. Graves and headstones were covered or used in the construction of the park. (See Essays: Leichhardt - Another Time.)


A row of single story terraced homes (out of view) overlooked the car park was demolished years later to make way for the expansion of the school. The homes located on Rawson Lane were owned by Leichhardt Municipal Council and demolished in the 1970's presumably to accommodate Leichhardt High School in 1976 when it was established.4

Woodwork classes were held on the second floor of the eastern building adjacent to Balmain Road. The class room contained workbenches with basic tools: bench hooks, scribes, chisels, mallets, squares, planes... Lessons involved using tools, joinery and finishing woodwork projects – skills for life.

Students wore aprons hung from the neck and tied behind the back. The sight of "tough" students wearing aprons was just a bit incongruous.

Projects included teapot stand, mallet and jewellery box (Shown).

The Company Sergeant Major (CSM) badge of rank was worn on the lower sleeves of the cadet uniform; it was a unique badge as only one cadet was chosen to be the CSM of the Cadet Unit; it was a privilege and honour.

The CSM was a person who could lead the Company with a high degree of leadership, integrity and respected by his peers; it was a "badge of honour" in more ways than one.

Descriptive Geometry and Drawing required certain types of instruments: compasses, scales, set-squares and tee-squares in dealing with plans and elevations of obscure shapes and representations.

The lessons included plan, elevation, isometric and perspective drawings to scale.

Mr. MacKay wore a grey overcoat with the top pocket filled with pens and pencils. He would insist that each drawing was not complete without a margin and title box.

Mathematical instruments were often the beginning of understanding measurements, Euclidean geometry and the "mysteries" of polygons.

The original school crest was designed by Mr. E. Smith, Principal, who used "straight lines as a reaction against the curved lines and scroll-work then fashionable" <sup>5</sup>

The motto Courage, Service, Faith and Truth avoided using a Latin inscription and was part of the school's crest.

The lamp of learning was included as the name lbrox was a Celtic word for badger and associated with Glasgow's lbrox Park and Scottish football.

"I was faced with the alternatives – a football or a badger... so I was forced to divorce the crest from the name and to fall back for an emblem upon the lamp of learning".<sup>6</sup>







### **End Notes**

"By the end of 1959, the school itself will have almost achieved its centenary, because it began its career as a National School in the year 1862, when there was no Department of Education and no compulsory schooling. For the first twelve years of its existence, it was called Petersham School and it was not until 1874 that it received its present proud name of Leichhardt. When it began it had 53 pupils, an enrolment which was to grow in the twentieth century to nearly 2000.

It has always been situated on its present site and today the oldest part of the building is the Primary Boys' Department. This was followed by the Infants' Department constructed in 1891. Six years later, as a result of the steady growth of the school, the handsome building which today accommodates the Girls' Primary Department and a large part of the Home science department was erected."

### Leichhardt - Another Time

Leichhardt was a working-class suburb until the 1960's. Some workers at the end of the day would gather for a pint or two at one of the many pubs in Norton Street; it was a time when trams rattled along Norton Street and ended their day at the Tramway Depot located at the top of William Street that ran along-side Treadgold Park adjacent to Balmain Cemetery, now Pioneers Memorial Park.

The depot had a westerly view of modest wooden cottages and an easterly outlook of distant Sydney. Most cottages were built on narrow blocks close to employment at the many factories that included: brick-making, sheet-metal, pottery, boot factory, soap works, meat-preserving, furniture, confectioners, timber, broom manufacturing, iron and brass foundries, wool, flour millers, coal merchants, breweries and a coal-fired power station. Shunting trains could be heard from the Charles Street Goods Siding and distant sounds of Shipwrights working in Iron Cove Bay would be carried on a northerly wind.<sup>1</sup>

Leichhardt's population consisted mainly of English, Irish, Welsh and Scottish descendents and immigrants – "Anglo Saxon Protestants", and a growing number of Italian, Greek, Chinese and other migrant settlers attracted to employment opportunities. They lived, worked and socialized in the close confines of a struggling working-class suburb of Sydney. Their homelands and traditions were often in their thoughts and day-to-day living. There was a clannish mindset that set groups apart and created a cultural setting derived from a mix of colonial and cultural values; it was a mish-mash of social and economic rivalry that reflected class structures, attitudes and personal traits: self-esteem, confidence and "knowing your place in society".

"Knowing your place" influenced values and shaped attitudes particularly towards employment and education. To aspire to the hierarchical middle/upper classes of Sydney was beyond their dreams – acceptance of their place in life was an inherited value - feelings of self-worth were linked to their place of belonging and laden-valued rules; it was part of being accepted into a uncompromising community. "Knowing your place" was continually reinforced by institutional policies that created limited employment and education opportunities within an implicit class structure. To find a job with little education and a working class mindset determined life's opportunities.

"Gotta spare bob, mate?" was an often heard by-line for some who were between jobs or a way to avoid being seen as "down and out" or "desperate for a beer". After all, if a "shilling" was spare, it wasn't needed.

"Haven't got a bob will a zac do? It was all an illusion; behind the shaggy face, bleary eyes and ragged clothes told another story; a story about a spent man returned from war to find civilian life had its own challenges.

"Dishing out" a sixpence was hardly enough for a "digger" but "it would do".

The "down-and-outers" had learnt to accept what life had dished-up. As young misguided men they rushed off to a war they did not understand; they saw many mates disappear. They returned home initially with much fanfare. However, there was no real counselling, little support and were told to get a job - they were expected to get on with their life and leave the horrors of war behind.

Wandering down Norton Street after a visit to a local, Sergeant Angus Fitzpatrick asked "Where's the cemetery... what happened?

"The cemetery was demolished... it's a park... Pioneers Memorial Park", quipped a mate.

"But me Dad's there", said Angus.

"They said they would put the headstones around the park... they never did... some monuments went to Camperdown Cemetery... the rest were covered" said another of his mates.

"All those souls lying there... no-way to treat the poor... it's not right... how am I gonna find Dad?

As Angus and his mates looked at what used to be a cemetery<sup>i</sup> they felt slighted. After all, if a resting place for the dead is not treated with respect what does that say for the living? They felt angry but could not express their heartfelt thoughts - it stirred their stomachs.

Angus jangled his service medals and thought about his father's stories about the times his dad played football on a dusty field that overlooked the cemetery. He remembered being carried on his shoulders as they walked home through the monuments pausing to read the inscriptions and talked about why poor people didn't have headstones and why they were now at peace.

Angus thought his Dad "would turn in his grave" if he knew what happened to the cemetery.

"It's a living shame" thought Angus.

People walked just about everywhere mainly to save money. Mothers carrying home shopping from the Parramatta Road shops with their children hanging onto two wheel canvas shopping trollies or clinging to their mother's floral dress; men sauntering to a local Norton Street pub to find out the latest on where to get a job and have a schooner or two; students meandering to school with leather satchels thrown over their shoulders with a couple of mean-looking-dried-up "vegemite sandwiches", a "piece of fruit" for lunch and hoping to get through the day without being caned; adolescents hanging around street corners leaning against walls having a "smoko" waiting to impress passing girls with their maturity; young children crossing railway lines returning "empties" to a local shop for "tuppence" a bottle and buying "chocolate bullets" at eight a penny; paper boys pushing wooden barrows up and down hills selling newspapers, wishing for a "penny tip".

Families would gather in the streets; boys played marbles in gutters and kicked footballs across the street's gravel road and clay verge; girls played "jacks" and dressed porcelain dolls. Street cricket was an all day game. Garbage bins served as wickets; a hand-made bat made from a paling fence and a worn out tennis ball was all that was needed. An occasional car was expected to slow down and drive around the makeshift cricket pitch. The street after all belonged to the people who lived there.

Mothers hung over front gates or swept the front path or chatted with passer-bys. Some were waiting for the ice-man to arrive with his horse drawn cart. In the early evening children were bathed in a tin

washing basin that doubled as a washing basket that carried the wet washing from a copper boiler. Most fathers came home tired and dirty after a strenuous day's work. They worked in factories, wharves, mines, yards and service industries in the area with little to show after a week's hard work.

Everyday street clothes were often ragged, threadbare and "hand-me-downs". Sunday best clothes really meant clothes that stayed in a cupboard that hardly saw the "light of day". Street clothes were not dictated by fashion; it was more to do with how much wear they had left in them; colour coordination was not a problem - brown, green, pink, blue and grey combined with odds and ends, big or small. If a shirt was not torn and had most of its buttons "it will do".

Clothes were practical and conforming; knotted turban-like headscarves, bobby pins, curlers of all shapes and sizes kept hair in-tact; aprons were standard attire adding a sort of grace to domestic chores together with long dresses and stockings. Multi-purpose straw brooms were not only for sweeping "out the front" to see what was going on in the street, but also to keep children in check with an occasional whack and a leaning prop for endless street conversations.

Street fashion did not distinguish between everyday clothes and every-other occasion clothes. The same clothes were worn until beyond repair. Children's street clothes were often their school clothes and every-other occasion clothes - a rag-tag collection of "hand-me-downs". Special occasion clothes were not worn for fear of wearing them out. Special, really meant an exceptional time - such as a wedding, birthday or funeral, which were show-piece times to rise above street clothes wearing something "special". These occasions justified having something new that could also be tucked away for that next special occasion - feeling good knowing "good clothes" remained good. Appearances were important and being overly concerned with what other people may think. No matter how thinly veiled, appearances were everything - even though most families did not have "two-bob to rub together" they would do their utmost to keep up false pretences.

Most of the homes had narrow corridors leading to the bedrooms, living room, kitchen, laundry and bathroom. The living room contained a small fireplace with a blackened grate and a mantle place filled with treasured ornaments and tinted photographs; it was the centre-piece of the home. The laundry included a "copper", wash basins and a "mangler" that squeezed the soapy water out of the washing as it was fed through the rollers turned by a handle. Often the washing doubled-up between the rollers or crushed shirt buttons causing much consternation. Weekly washings involved heating the water in the "copper" by a fire made from newspapers and splintered wood. Wooden fruit boxes provided kindling as firewood was always in short supply. A "poker" turned the bubbling washing until it was considered done. The washing was hung with "dolly" pegs on a clothes line strung between the backyard fences propped up by wooden "clothes props". The washing involved several loads: "whites, coloureds, work clothes" in that order; it was almost a full day affair and usually it was a Monday – "Monday wash day".

Frankie Fitzpatrick lived in a run-down weather board home on a narrow block with a back lane; it was rented from a not-so-considerate landlord who kept track of payments through a rent book that was dutifully initialled with each weekly payment. One of Frankie's jobs was to take the rent money each week to the landlord who lived in Lilyfield. He was aware of making sure that the landlord signed the rent book as proof of payment – nobody trusted landlords.

Frankie's home was like other homes in Francis Street, Leichhardt - except it had a striking gable roof complete with curved facia boards and pointed ridge finials. No other houses were as decorative and Frankie thought his home was a little bit special.

It had a front veranda with tessellated tiling; a brass name plate, a blistered cream door and a step worn down into a gully with dimples that collected rainwater.

As a child, Frankie played with his lead soldiers on the front step within ear-shot of his mother. He recalled his father's war-time stories and imagined the dimples in the front step as land mines that would blow-up his soldiers if they were not placed in the right spot. At an early age Frankie had learnt to "watch his step" and for him, playing on the front step had added meaning.

Frankie's makeshift bedroom was a closed-in back verandah with steps down to the backyard enclosed by a corrugated-iron fence. His bedroom window overlooked the back lane where the "night-soil men" would enter through the back gate and empty the toilet cans in the small hours of the night. The gate was made from disused splintered wood and rusty tin sheeting that was slowly falling apart; it had a bolt and latch, which was unlatched through a hole in the tin sheeting. There were no padlocks only the raucous sound of the bolt scrapping against the latch as it opened and closed. At night, Frankie could hear the "night-soil men" come and go with no fanfare, apart from the screech of the latch as the back gate opened and closed.

The lane was a haven for rodents and anything else that lived off the droppings, food scraps and rubbish that accumulated amongst the garbage cans and tomcats. The lane was a not-so-secret place for S.P.<sup>3</sup> Bookmakers, "sly-grog" merchants and a brothel. They exploited the locals one way or another – running up a debt book with exorbitant interest rates; selling cheap "plonk" at all hours; offering peccadilloes clandestine pleasures. The locals thought it was just a part of life living so close to these lane-way "services".

The main problem was the undesirable rogues that would traipse up and down the lane at all times of the night. Sometimes there were altercations in the lane where matters were settled; it was not a place for the faint hearted. Frankie knew from his father Angus "never poke your nose into other people's business"; it was an unspoken "live and let live" law of the tough streets of Leichhardt.

Frankie observed life to the full. He was introverted, shy and moulded by indecisive shames and inferiorities that froze him to inaction. However, he would forensically examine life's offerings. As inarticulate as Frankie was, he understood more than he let on. He knew his time would come but in the meantime, he gathered knowledge and developed an indefatigable attitude towards a world where only the strongest survived.

The "Architectus - Leichhardt Walking Tour" brochure states that "the burials had few prominent people" including Edmund Blacket (Architect), Thomas Rowntree (Architect) and Ferdinand Reus (Surveyor) and that sixteen memorials were relocated to Camperdown Cemetery.

The extent of the cemetery and comparison with similar sized cemeteries of that time would indicate that the number of burials are similar as published by Keith Johnson (10,900 burials) and the Balmain Cemetery Registry Index (10,608 burials).

Why have there been ongoing concerns with Balmain Cemetery? Could it involve a "living shame" of how the cemetery was brutally "converted" into a "rest park and garden area" in 1941?

The "destruction" of Balmain Cemetery is vividly shown by film footage discovered by Tricia Mark in 2004. It shows workmen pulling over a headstone; a horse being driven to drag out another headstone; a headstone being sectioned

into blocks by a workman with chisels; shaping part of a headstone into a rectangular block; building a park wall from the cut blocks.

Many of Leichhardt's 1950's residents talked in hushed concerns about the "dead" buried under the park; children on the way home from Scouts in Balmain Road being warned of "ghosts" and not to walk through the park; families preferring to use other parks rather than "disturbing the dead"; boys playing football and told to stop without knowing why, after all it was a park.

In short, Balmain Cemetery was levelled after the monuments of "prominent people" were removed to Camperdown Cemetery. Over 10,600 graves and associated headstones and memorials of the not-so-prominent people were covered with fill or used in the "conversion" of the cemetery into a "rest park and garden area". Headstones and monuments were broken-up or carved into blocks for a park wall. Only a few of the monument's inscriptions were transcribed and no headstones were placed as memorials around the site as required by the "Old Balmain (Leichhardt) Act, 1941".

The present day park wall extends partly around Pioneers Memorial Park and for some people, evokes memories of the "destruction" of the cemetery and the treatment of its occupants, Leichhardt's early working-class settlers.

The sandstone park wall creates an enigmatic presence - a tidy handcrafted stone wall or remnant headstones laying face-to-face hiding likely inscriptions and emotive sentiments?

The headstone park wall casts a perennial dark shadow on Leichhardt's history. For many people, it is a reminder of a time when a cemetery and its burials were disgracefully treated.

Today, the shadow of Balmain Cemetery lingers; it is a buried heritage with a shameful past requiring thoughtful attention rather than trusting the passing of time will eventually "lay to rest" Leichhardt's returning past.

### **Attitude**

"The longer I live I realize the impact of attitude in life. Attitude to me is more important than fact. It is more important than the past, than education, than money, than circumstances, than failures, than success, than what other people think, say or do. It is more important than appearance, giftedness or skill. It will make or break a company, a church, a home. The remarkable thing is that we have a choice everyday regarding the attitude we embrace each day. We cannot change our past, we cannot change the fact that people will act in a certain way. We cannot change the inevitable. The only thing we can do is to choose our attitude.

I am convinced that life is ten per cent of what happens and ninety per cent of how we react... and so it is with you.

You are in charge of your attitude." 1

Life's personal challenges may also be accompanied with a need to search for an explanation, particularly, when struggles are overwhelming and involve raw emotions. Some people have tried to make sense of their circumstances and have endeavoured to understand their personal make-up by exploring their responses and whether there may be a greater purpose that can help explain their situation.

Dr. Viktor Frankl<sup>2</sup> learnt through his own suffering that human life has meaning. He found that individuals have an inherent freedom that cannot be smothered, even in the most deplorable circumstances of hopelessness and despair. As a long time prisoner in a concentration camp he lost every possession and his personal values and beliefs were intensely challenged. He suffered from hunger, cold, brutality and expected to die each day. Dr. Frankl found that even in such terrible conditions of extreme emotional and physical stress, one thing remains: "a freedom to choose your own attitude to any set of circumstances... to choose your own way".

As tough as any personal struggle may be, every person ultimately has a choice in how they respond to challenges. The ultimate resolution of a personal struggle may come down to knowing that everyone has the freedom to choose his or her response towards any struggle; it may be an extremely difficult and arduous choice to make, particularly when emotional feelings are mixed and running high; it may be a bewildering time when a person has little capability to cope with overwhelming circumstances; it may be impossible to make a choice during this period. However, there will come a time, when a person is able to choose their response to any challenge and eventually come to terms with personal struggles.

Managing and dealing with a crisis is a challenging time of mixed emotions; it is an opportunity for greater understanding. For example, a person's choice may be a resolution to make things better or building a determination not to give up. The acceptance of a struggle is an opportunity for personal growth that can be a step towards greater understanding, discovery of meaning and release of emotional pain. The meaning of a personal struggle can be a profound interpretation that makes sense of the incomprehensible or a discovery of a simple truth. For some, there have been differing degrees of responses for the same sort of struggle and through choice, it was possible to create positive outcomes.


There are many types of struggles and with each struggle there are times when a person is able to choose their response and make changes. A person's response may be positive or negative. A positive choice provides an optimistic view with meaning and hope. Negative choices provide a pessimistic view involving a sense of meaningless and despair. A negative choice will prolong pain and impede the resolution of a person's struggle. Positive choices are more likely to lead to positive outcomes. In simple terms - a person's attitude depends upon making a choice between varying degrees of hope and despair.

The response to every personal struggle involves a positive or negative choice as shown below. A person's choice can convert a negative experience into a positive outcome. Anger may be transformed into calm; grief may lead to joy and rejection transformed into belonging. Personal struggles involve a person's experience, love, emotion and wellbeing. Each struggle is shaped by positive or negative choices. Above the choice line, there is opportunity for meaning and hope, below the choice line, there are negative constraints that are often meaningless and promote fear.

There are no "magical" solutions for personal struggles. A person needs love, understanding, care and support provided by their family and close friends who are linked by a shared commitment to care for another. With genuine support, determination and a positive attitude, a person can learn to better manage personal struggles.<sup>3</sup>

It was a hot dry day. The sun stung on the back of sweat-stained shirts weighed down by hundreds of sticky black flies that took turns to attack the corners of eyes as sweat trickled down the middle of backs, rolling down legs and pooling into hob-nailed boots.

Just standing up, let alone holding a Lee-Enfield .303 bolt action rifle; carrying a heavy pack that included a ground sheet ("poncho"), blanket, eating utensil ("dixie"), enamel mug, food rations and walking in weighty boots was an achievement in itself. With all this weight, the cadet patrol moved silently in double file; avoiding dried twigs that would snap with a loud clack that rose above the droning sounds of the Australian bush.

The second Platoon of the Ibrox Park Cadet Unit was on a contact exercise; its mission was to engage the "enemy" with tactical manoeuvres involving twenty 14-16 year old cadet soldiers armed with obsolete .303 rifles and blank cartridges. Each patrol had a pretend rapid fire "Bren-gun" – a .303 rifle with a handkerchief tied around its barrel. The patrol scout was typically a hundred metres ahead of the main group who used hand signals to communicate with the patrol leader. Each patrol had a radio operator. The radio was configured as a back-pack with an aerial, headset and microphone. An independent observer (Messrs D. Enock or G. McGill – Ibrox Park Teachers) were assigned to each contact patrol. Their job was to assess the outcome of each contact and indirectly provide guidance.

The "enemy" were four other patrols moving in a circular direction around a course of four checkpoints. The patrol leader had a map and compass to find the checkpoints as well as staying on course to contact patrols heading in the opposite direction. In theory, each patrol was expected to have four contacts, which was problematic as most patrol leaders had not used a compass before and had no idea how to work out distances from pacing or map reading.

The patrol passed into shadowed ground sparsely populated by spotted gums, low scrub littered with scrubby undergrowth and steepening slopes rising on the right-side of the patrol. Somewhere ahead an "enemy" patrol would be listening, pausing and moving towards them. It was difficult terrain to move through without making a sound. The patrol leader signalled to the "Bren-gun" unit to move to the right and follow the high ground. The land started to open up. The mottled sun flickering through branches created impressions of movement ahead. With each sound, flicker and rampant imagination, the bush came alive with the "enemy" everywhere. Excitement was building; eyes darting from the front, then to either side of the patrol. "Was that the point of a rifle... no, just a shadow?" The excitement spread to all patrol members; they glanced at each other, some pointing ahead, others transfixed.

The patrol leader knew something was not right; it may have been a feeling but he was going to act on it. He signalled to the patrol to move back to a defensive position on the high ground. The "Bren-gun" unit took a position on the extreme right moving forward below the high ground on the other side of the ridge to about two hundred meters ahead and then crawled silently back to the ridge where they found the "enemy" laying in ambush waiting for our patrol.

The cadets in charge of the "Bren-gun" exchanged looks; it was cocked and then fired as quickly as it took to work the bolt action. "Bang, bang, bang" each blank firing out plumes of smoke and paper particles.

The "enemy" were caught out and had no other recourse but to flee down-hill unknowingly into the path of our other patrol members. "Bang, bang, bang" more blanks fired. The enemy were trapped between the handkerchief "Bren-gun" on the high ground and a line of "riflemen" on their flank; it was the end of the contact; it was a classic pincer manoeuvre straight out of an Ancient History text book.

The observers compared notes while the patrol leader formed up his Platoon. At the ready, the Platoon moved on through the bush as twigs and eucalyptus leaves crunched and clacked under foot in harmony with the cicada's shrill applause. The patrol marched along a track to the next checkpoint as the rain started to drizzle.

Arriving at the checkpoint a level cleared area was selected for an overnight camp. Ponchos were clipped together to make a tent. Rope was strung between trees and make-do tents soon littered the area. For some students, it was their first camp and they would have wondered what they were doing in the "middle-of-nowhere" putting up dubious tents in the rain.

A fire was started. "Bully beef" and vegetables were cooked in an oversized pot and served in "dixies" with bread. After the sumptuous meal a Platoon of boys stood in the drizzling rain beside a warming fire watching its flames dance along the eucalyptus firewood. Their minds recalling the day and thinking it was time for sleep.



### Life of Pi

Pi or  $\Pi$  is a mathematical constant that comes from the ratio of a circle's circumference to its diameter, which is approximately equal to 3.141592. It has been represented by the Greek letter " $\Pi$ " since the mid-18th century; it is sometimes written as pi; it is an irrational number – a never ending number that does not settle into a repeating pattern.




The value of Pi's digits appears to be random, although no proof of this has been discovered.

Mathematicians have attempted to extend their understanding of  $\Pi$  and computing its value. Before the 15th century, mathematicians such as Archimedes and Liu Hui used geometrical techniques, based on polygons, to estimate the value of  $\Pi$ .

From about the 15th century Isaac Newton, Leonard Euler, Srinivasa Ramanujan and others, developed new algorithms that revolutionised the computation of  $\Pi$ .

In the 20th century, mathematicians developed new approaches using computers. As a result, the value of  $\Pi$  dramatically increased to over 10 trillion (10<sup>13</sup>) digits. However, despite the human need to continually break records, most applications require no more than 40 digits of  $\Pi$ . In trigonometry and geometry applications the value of  $\Pi$  to six decimal places (3.141592) is more than adequate for most calculations.



∏ is commonly defined by the ratio of a circle's circumference to its diameter. The ratio C/D is constant, regardless of the circle's size.

This definition of  $\Pi$  is not universal and only valid for Euclidean Geometry (flat surfaces); it is not valid for curved non-Euclidean geometries.

Start with 3, then remember the sentence

"I wish I could translate pi."

The decimals parts of ∏ is represented by the number of letters in each word of the sentence

### Remember when rock was young...

The effects of "The Depression" lingered and the melancholy of World War II was being left behind. The inner suburbs of Sydney were getting back to normal. In reality, it was more about the beginning of a new time that hardly looked like the "old days".

Our parents had been toughened by times past and many yearned for the "good old days" to return but with renewed energy and a brighter world. They inspired in their children values largely shaped by the past and hopes strengthened by a resilience that comes from struggles. They had learnt how to get by and scrape out a living. Their children were going to be different and have the opportunities denied to them. After being able to "put food on the table" and "a roof over your head", the education of their kids was next. It was seen as a way to avoid what they have been through. Leaving school barely able to read or write, working in the mines, lugging bales of wool, indentured domestic duties, cleaning and other working class occupations.

Sydney's class structure was alive and kicking. The opportunity to attend a "superior" school involved bursaries, assessments, finances and family support. Few parents completed the Intermediate Certificate, let alone the Leaving Certificate, and even fewer attended University. The need for income and the cost of University fees were insurmountable obstacles. The course of their education was limited by personal and family needs. There was no choice but to leave school at an early age and earn a living.

The 1950's brought Saturday afternoon "flicks" where "Jaffa" chocolate balls rolled down wooden floors and clanked into the cast iron legs of well-worn seats; shrieking at cartoons, particularly the "Road Runner" who always outsmarted a conniving Coyote; cheering Heroes (Flash Gordon, The Shadow) and booing villains (Martians, Red Indians, Scar Faced Pirates) in the weekly serials played before the double feature. At interval, it was time to sneak in hot chips under arms or jumpers trying to hide the give-away smell to the ushers who guarded the swinging doors to the theatre.

At home, we listened to radio serials (Laugh to You Cry, Police Files) on a Sunday night and during the week with Sammy Sparrow, Green Bottle and The Goons, but it all started to change when television appeared in the mid 1950s. One by one TV antennas appeared above the roof tops like stick creatures that "brought the world into your living room". These marching stick structures were a huge statement and a boost to family status. Having a TV was showing the world that this home could afford a TV. It did not matter that programming started at 4 PM and finished at 10 PM. We were contented to watch the test pattern with its geometric shapes transform into life with the announcement "TCN Nine, the first in television is ready for transmission" followed by black and white grainy images.

Kids would gather around the TV - lying on the floor mesmerised by the flickering shadowy images. Fathers would come home and wonder where all these children came from as they stepped across legs and disappeared into the adjoining kitchen for dinner. As a spin-off, their children became very popular at school as they attracted the attention of new friends who wanted to come around to their home and watch TV.

We were glued to TV from the start to the finish watching shows like The Mickey Mouse Club, Highway Patrol, Gun Smoke, Perry Mason and Six O'clock Rock. It was the start of feeling no longer left out from the rest of the world and unbeknown to us things would never be the same again. Imagine watching the news and seeing places for the first time or transfixed to a five day Test match between England and Australia or absorbed into Saturday's match of the day with the "Tigers" and "Rabbitohs" battling it out at Leichhardt Oval. Why go to the game when you can watch it on TV?

However, some things stayed the same: Sunday lunch at Nan's; collecting milk bottles at the front door left that morning by the "Milko"; waiting for the "Paper Boy" to come down the street with the newspapers and playing in the street until dark.

The children of the post-war period had become teenagers and started to challenge the things of yesteryear, especially music. Who needed Benny Goodman, Patti Page or Perry Como? We had "rock n roll". "Only the Lonely"; "It's Now or Never" and "Save the Last Dance for Me" rung into our

minds and fuelled a different view of what Mum and Dad thought about music. Music transformed values and set expectations. Truth was mete-out by the likes of Elvis Presley, Roy Orbison, Buddy Holly, The Everly Brothers, The Beatles and The Rolling Stones - the list goes on. We had found a new way of thinking about what was important, like needle pointed shoes, white socks, skin tight jeans, swagger and particularly, attitude.

The Vietnam War watched on the evening TV news spawned protest marches along George Street, Sydney and gave rise to questions about the morality of any war and National Service.

The day of the "long-haired git" had arrived with thoughts that education caused problems. These long-haired adolescents wanted no part of this or any other war. They had found a voice in their music. It was a strong voice that proclaimed loud and clear they wanted no part in war. "Old-timers" who had experienced war were at odds with these "baby-boomers" who in their eyes were making trouble and didn't deserve an education.

The generation gap heightened differences rather than sharing commonalities. Those who had been to war felt the sting of criticism from these "no-hopers; it discredited their service and dishonoured their fallen mates; it was a personal affront. Commonalities were set aside while the battle of right and wrong prevailed. There were many arguments about sanctity of war and peace.

And like the great publication by Tolstoy, commonalities gradually over-took the differences between the "baby boomers" and the "old-timers". Rather than justifying historical events based on political leadership, great heroes and generational beliefs, they came to understand that people can change the world through smaller events by the weight of individuals. Tolstoy argued that these smaller events are the outcome of the inverse relationship between necessity and free-will - necessity based on reason and personal free-will to do what has to be done at a time of need, rather than for the sake of war.

The resolution of generational differences was the focus of the Australian play by Alan Seymour, "The One Day of the Year" about ANZAC Day, produced in 1958. Amongst other things, the play provides a poignant message about a father-and-son relationship based on a dichotomy for the need for an education of the mind as well as an emotional education – both are needed to better understand generational differences.

So here we are now, all grown-up with grey or little hair, bent over, sagging wrinkled skin, annoying creaking niggling joints, unexplainable groans as we get out of bed in the morning and facing the day as an aging "senior". Being a "senior" we have found a way to put off old age and delay the notion of being a dependent pensioner. We insist our sixties are now the new fifties. We don't give "tuppence" for the opinions of others, after all we have seen it all before. We remember the past as if it was yesterday and not sure what we did today. We are not impressed that Maths and Science are no longer compulsory at school and student discipline involves psychological analysis rather than "six of the best". We wonder what could have been and satisfied our time was the best.

And if that is not enough, we struggle with generational differences. We don't understand the music of today's youth any more than the *"old timers"* who didn't understand our music.

We remember when rock was young...

"We were hopping and bopping to the Crocodile Rock... I never knew me a better time and I guess I never will..." 1

That Ian Chapman invited me to that first class reunion because every year we get together and it brings back wonderful memories.


### Best teacher was ...






93. Forest Lodge Primary School, Transition Class,1953 Student Names.







## Ibrox Park... A Place Name

"The importance of belonging is a visceral human need, especially to a place. Belonging depends on a potent sense of the past and an unshakeable sagacity of faith built on past times".

Leichhardt's Ibrox Park was named after Ibrox Park in Glasgow, Scotland, which first appeared in Leichhardt's 1880 Municipality Map and adopted by Ibrox Park Boys' High School during 1960-76. A Gaelic interpretation of Ibrox is a group of badgers.

For many of Leichhardt's early settlers, Ibrox Park epitomised working-class aspirations when times were tough; it became a place where dreams for a grander life were shared by different generations struggling with social, economic and cultural hardships - a place where Leichhardt's early settlers played football on a dusty field named after their distant homeland and later where school students endeavoured to learn.

### **Naming Application**




Figure 1: Name Proposal, Ibrox Park

The place name Ibrox Park was approved by the NSW Geographical Names Board in 2012 to be included as a heritage item in the NSW Geographical Names Board Register. A Naming Application was subsequently made to Leichhardt Council in February 2015 to rename Derbyshire Reserve to Ibrox Park. In May 2015 Leichhardt Council completed a community consultation in relation to this application and agreed to name Lots 2-8 in DP2393 as Ibrox Park. (Figure 1)

The NSW Geographical Board on the 2 October approved the naming of Lots 2-8 DP2393 bounded by Balmain and Derbyshire Roads as Ibrox Park. (Figure 3 - NSW Government Gazette Notice).

## **Appendix 4**

The Name Application for Ibrox Park was justified by the following key points:




Figure 2: Extract - Leichhardt Municipal Map, 1880's

- 1 Ibrox Park is a place name that is part of the land bounded by Derbyshire and Balmain Roads in the suburb of Leichhardt, NSW. The original portion of Ibrox Park is presently part of the Sydney Secondary College and enclosed within the southern part of Lot 100, DP1147039 under the control of the NSW Education Department. Derbyshire Reserve is the last remaining part of the original portion (Figure 2) and is managed by Leichhardt Municipal Council.
- 2 Leichhardt's Ibrox Park has been thought to be named by Scottish immigrants/descendents that played football on the site and named it after Glasgow's Ibrox Park.

The place name Ibrox Park first appeared in the Leichhardt Municipality Map, 1880's. (Figure 2).

The name Ibrox Park was subsequently adopted as the name for a secondary school, Ibrox Park Boys High School during 1960-76.

- 3 The place name Ibrox Park is an integral part of Leichhardt's history since the 1880's.
  - Ibrox Park is more than just a place for Scottish Immigrants to play football in a dusty Leichhardt field back in the 1880's and for school students to learn, play and grow during 1960-76; it is a place that has been linked through a common heritage and a common dream for a grander life at different times.
- 4 Leichhardt's Ibrox Park is a place with significant historical and social values that epitomises working class aspirations when times were particularly tough. It was a place where dreams were shared by different generations struggling with social, economic and cultural hardships.
- 5 Ibrox Park meant different things to different people; its significance comes from a notion of a place in Leichhardt where early Scottish immigrants dreamt of a grander life in Glasgow Ibrox Park. It was the same place during 1960-76 where Ibrox Park Boys High School students also dreamt of a grander life.
- 6 Ibrox Park BHS is part of Leichhardt's Secondary School's heritage that started in 1862 when there was no NSW Department of Education and no compulsory schooling. The lineage of Leichhardt's Secondary Schools include: National School (known as Petersham School), Leichhardt Trades School, Leichhardt Domestic Science Girls School, Leichhardt Girls High School, Leichhardt Technical School, Ibrox Park Boys High School, Leichhardt High and Sydney Secondary College.
- 7 The naming application involved the renaming of Derbyshire Reserve to Ibrox Park. The application was approved by Leichhardt Municipal Council. Derbyshire Reserve stands on the last remaining part of the original portion Ibrox Park and as such would strengthen historical links with Leichhardt's early development when its settlers struggled with working class circumstances associated with challenging times.
